

Frosty & Cool Lighted Snowman

Antiquing this piece brown gives it a rustic and (trendy!) Farmhouse look. A cool and muted color palette means Frosty can stay up all Winter.



Supplies

Lighted Frosty (#1991)

Pencil

Liner Brush

Small Round Brush

Medium Round Brush

Sponge

Color

Brown Cow SC-41

Basketball SC-80

Old Lace SC-86

Tiger Tail SC-5

Blue Dawn SC-30

Char-ming SC-99

Seabreeze SC-91

Tuxedo SC-15

Bluegrass SC-29



Instructions

1. Paint the entire piece with a thick coat of Brown Cow.
2. Use a damp sponge to remove most of Brown Cow from the high points, leaving paint in the cracks of the design. The more you remove, the less you'll see peeking through after the piece is fired. This process is called antiquing.
3. Use a small round brush to paint the face and body with 1-2 thick coats of Old Lace. The more paint you apply, the less of the Brown Cow you will see.
4. Paint the main section of the hat and the scarf with Seabreeze.
5. Use a small round brush to paint the sweater with 1-2 coats of Blue Dawn.
6. Use a liner brush to paint the nose Basketball.
7. Paint circles on the cheeks using a liner brush and Tiger Tail.
8. Use a liner brush to paint the mittens and hat rim and topper with Bluegrass.
9. Add stars to the cheeks using a liner brush and Basketball.
10. Dip the back of a brush in Tuxedo and dot the eyes.
11. Dip the eraser end of a brush into Charming and add button dots to the sweater.
12. Use the liner brush to add any other sweater details like pocket or stripes.
13. Use a liner brush to add Tuxedo details to the snowman.
14. Clear glaze. Check the holes in the hat for clogs and clean out by using a clean mascara brush, fettling knife, or pipe cleaner.
15. Fire to cone 06.
16. Attach the bulb end of the light kit into the bottom of the snowman, making sure the metal prongs are secured to the edge of the opening. Plug in and turn on the light switch to make Frosty shine!



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
